

**Steven M. Hilton  
Chairman, President and CEO**

Steven Hilton, grandson of the late hotel entrepreneur who created the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation, has worked in the field of philanthropy for more than 20 years. Steven Hilton joined the Foundation in 1983 and has held numerous positions over the years, including Program Assistant, Program Associate, and Vice President, Programs. He was named President in 1998 and in 2005 the board of directors also appointed him Chairman and CEO.

Hilton oversees an annual grantmaking budget of more than \$40 million. Most of the Foundation's grants are applied to long-term projects such as water development in Africa and other countries; early childhood development for disabled babies and toddlers; youths substance abuse prevention; housing for the mentally ill homeless; worldwide blindness prevention and services; and support for the work of Catholic Sisters.

Prior to joining the Foundation, Hilton worked for five years in hotel management in Alabama, Georgia and California with the Hilton Hotels Corporation. He was also involved in aquaculture (fish farming) businesses in California and Hawaii. A graduate of the University of California at Santa Barbara, Hilton earned his Masters of Business Administration (MBA) degree from the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA).

Hilton serves on the boards of both the Foundation and the Conrad N. Hilton Fund. In addition, he serves on the boards of St. Joseph Center and the Southern California Grantmakers.

**Judy M. Miller  
Director, Conrad N. Hilton Humanitarian Prize  
Vice President, Conrad N. Hilton Foundation**

Judy Miller oversees all aspects of the Hilton Humanitarian Prize, from the nomination process to the final selection by an international panel of jurors. She is also responsible for planning and executing the annual Hilton international humanitarian symposiums. Miller has more than 35 years experience working in both the corporate and nonprofit sectors, specializing in public relations, international marketing, and government affairs.

Prior to joining the Hilton Foundation in 1997, Miller helped establish and manage for seven years a national nonprofit organization combating alcohol abuse in the United States. Before that, she was senior vice president, marketing, of a public relations and business consulting firm and for 15 years implemented communications strategies for corporations, foundations, and government agencies. Miller was the first female executive in a major Japanese corporation, Suntory Limited, representing its interests in all English-speaking countries for 15 years.

Miller was appointed Commissioner of the Los Angeles Department of Water & Power, the largest municipal utility in the world, stepping down in 2001 as its vice president. She is a founding director of Children Now, serves on the board of the Foundation for American Communications, and is a member of the Pacific Council on International Policy and the International Women's Forum, a global network of women leaders in 21 countries.
